2016 Spring Shaker Forum

April 22 - 24, 2016

A weekend conference at the Enfield Shaker Museum

The Enfield Shaker Museum's Annual Forum on the Shakers will be held on April 22 – 24, 2016. The Museum is seeking proposals for papers and presentations for Saturday, April 23 from 9 am – 4 pm. Preference will be given to proposals based on primary sources such as, but not limited to, journals, ledger books, oral histories, newspapers, artifacts, correspondence and maps. Each lecture must be no more than 45 minutes with an additional 15 minutes for questions and answers. **Shaker Workshops** will once again award a **\$500 cash prize** to the presenter demonstrating the highest standard in new, outstanding scholarship. **All presenters will receive a free weekend package.**



Timber-framing in the East Brethren's Shop has been completed and the reproduction windows have been installed so the building is ready for its new clapboards. The last four Preservation Wednesdays have been spent priming the more than 7,500 board feet of newly sawn clapboards, fortunately the weather cooperated and allowed our volunteers to paint out of doors. performances will be held all day on Saturday, April 23. A dinner and program will be held on Saturday evening. Site-related programs and tours will be held on Sunday morning following breakfast.

To Submit a Proposal: Send an abstract of 500 words or fewer and a CV or resume by January 15 to Enfield Shaker Museum, 447 NH Route 4A, Enfield, NH 03748, or email to education@shakermuseum.org. Please include your name, address and a phone number in your email. Applicants will be notified of the presenting schedule by February 12. Those eligible for receipt of the Shaker Workshops' Award will be asked to submit their papers (preferably by email) by March 11. The winner will be announced on Saturday, April 23. Applicants with Abstracts not chosen may participate in a poster session shown throughout the weekend.

General Registration: Weekend package rates for the general audience are double occupancy \$275 per person and single occupancy \$350 per person, including all meals and programs. Saturday overnight package double occupancy is \$160 per person; single occupancy is \$200 per person, including all meals and programs for Saturday and Sunday. Education News

I am so pleased to be the new Education Coordinator at the Enfield Shaker Museum, and I want to thank the search committee, Board of Directors and Dolores Struckhoff for this opportunity. I bring a strong background in teaching the very young, older youth, and college students, as well as enabling adults to engage in creative educational experiences. I will use my Museum Education Certificate from Tufts University, Master of Education and Bachelor's in Psychology from Plymouth State University, and years of formal training and self-taught Studio Art and Art Education to build a repertoire of Shaker-inspired programs for all ages and abilities.

My goal for the Enfield Shaker Museum is to apply my passion for learning to encourage more children and adults to visit the Enfield Shaker Museum and learn about the site. I intend to continue offering established programs as well as new Shaker-inspired experiences through an array of interactive programming. My love for the outdoors will encourage programming that continues and increases use of the grounds and adjacent state property.

As I continue to learn about the Shakers, specifically the Enfield Shaker families, along with their

self-sustainable communal living, ingenious inventions and entrepreneurial practices, work ethics, and devotion to a spiritual life, I am working with the other Museum staff, Shaker scholars and knowledgeable volunteers to develop a robust selection of educational opportunities.

The Museum's buildings and grounds offer many opportunities for educational programming. The Great Stone Dwelling remains the core of the Museum's interpretive tour, is also a gathering place for Shaker Sings, a welcoming place for craft demonstrations, and workshops ranging from Cooking with Herbs to creating Gift Drawings. The Ministry Shop sits on the site of the Church Family Schoolhouse, and today houses children's educational materials and hands-on activities.

My transition from the AVA Gallery and Art Center to the Enfield Shaker Museum was a smooth one. My first full week included learning about Shaker life along with the campers enrolled in the 2015 AVA/ESM collaborative summer vacation camp, **Art Explorations at the Enfield Shaker Museum.** On your next visit to the Museum be sure to look for the dry etching print hanging in the Ministry made by the campers.

Since then, I have spent time getting to know the staff and their responsibilities as well as the many dedicated volunteers and longtime Museum supporters.

It has been a pleasure to work closely with the core group of **Shaker Harvest Festival** organizers to put together a very successful event. On September 26, more than 450 festival participants (a record number) enjoyed the pristine early autumn day with many activity choices. The children rode ponies and whole families took wagon rides. Adults and children hand-pressed apple cider and made apple cider ice cream. It was delightful to see the children wearing the harvest masks and crowns they had created, while their parents and grandparents carefully guarded their handmade fairy houses.
